In presenting this evening's concert, the Arts and Our Faith Committee acknowledges the generous support of the Dr. Reid and Marguerite Pitts Special Music Fund.

From Renaissance Spain through modern-day America, composers have been captivated by the greater expressive potential of writing choral music in eight parts rather than the traditional four. The rich harmonies and breathtaking counterpoint of this genre are a feast for the ears and have given rise to some of the most ravishing choral music ever written. We're absolutely delighted to share some of our favorite selections from this repertoire with you this evening, each one of which is an outstanding and powerful piece in its own right. For many of us who make our home in the world of choral music, however, the crowning achievement in this genre is undoubtedly the beguiling Mass for Double Choir by the Swiss composer Frank Martin (pronounced "marTEHN").

Frank Martin was deeply influenced and affected by music of the past. In the words of music writer Alex Ross, Martin's Mass for double choir a cappella "sounds like a Renaissance mass lost in time, aware nonetheless of long centuries passing and new horrors unfolding." Frank Martin was born in Geneva, Switzerland in 1890. His father was a Calvinist minister and his ancestors included French Huguenots who left France in the 16th century, displaced by the French Wars of Religion. Martin grew up steeped in the traditions of the reformed church and much of his artistic output was inspired by a deep Christian faith. He composed most of his remarkable Mass in 1922, though he did not complete the final movement, the Agnus Dei, until 1926. At this point, Martin locked the score away in a drawer for nearly forty years. Neither the composer (then in his 30s) nor anyone else would hear the piece performed until Martin was an old man.

That a composition of such luminescence and searing beauty should go unknown for so long seems unthinkable now. But for Martin, the piece was deeply personal; a musical confession of faith. As he wrote in 1970, "I did not at all desire that the work be performed, believing that it would be judged entirely from an aesthetic point of view. I saw it entirely as an affair between God and myself ... the expression of religious sentiments, it seems to me, should remain secret and have nothing to do with public opinion." Yet, in 1963, after a great deal of persuasion from the director of the Bugenhagen Kantorei of Hamburg, Germany, Martin released his Mass for publication and performance. The importance of this exquisite composition was recognized immediately, and, in the decades since, the Mass for Double Choir has been cherished repertoire for serious choral ensembles throughout the world.

The Fifth Avenue Chamber Choir

Founded in 2013, the Fifth Avenue Chamber Choir is a vocal ensemble comprising some of New York's finest professional singers. With a diverse repertoire spanning Renaissance polyphony through contemporary American, the Chamber Choir presents an exciting series of sacred music concerts each season in Kirkland Chapel, their home venue at Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church. Although the size of the choir varies between 16 and 24 singers, the ensemble's primary goal never changes: we seek to uplift and inspire all who hear us through passionate, engaging, and highly-polished performances of sacred choral music.

Ryan Jackson, Director

Acclaimed organist and choral director Ryan Jackson was appointed the William S. Perper Director of Music and Fine Arts Ministries at Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church in 2012, following an international search. Ryan is the founding director of the professional Fifth Avenue Chamber Choir, as well as the Community Choir, a teaching ensemble open to all members of the church community. In 2013, Ryan established Fifth Avenue's annual concert series, which features a diverse program of choral concerts and organ recitals each season.

Prior to his appointment at Fifth Avenue, Ryan served in the music programs at Christ Church United Methodist on Park Avenue; the University Church at Yale; Christ Church Episcopal in New Haven; and Metropolitan United Church in Toronto. In addition to his work at Fifth Avenue, Ryan maintains an active recital schedule throughout the United States and his native Canada where his performances have been praised for their "mature musicality, technical poise, and registrational sensitivity" (*RCCO Bulletin*). Ryan is also on the faculty at the Juilliard School where he teaches a course in sacred music skills to organ majors.

The winner of numerous prestigious competitions, including the Royal Canadian College of Organists' National Organ Playing Competition, he has studied with several of the most prominent organists of the day, including Patricia Wright, Thomas Murray, and Paul Jacobs. Ryan is a graduate of the University of Toronto (Mus.Bac.Perf.), Yale University (M.M.), and The Juilliard School (D.M.A.).

THE CHOIRS OF FIFTH AVENUE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

The Fifth Avenue Chamber Choir is a select vocal ensemble of 16 to 25 of New York's finest professional singers. Striving always to achieve the highest standard of ensemble singing, this choir presents several concerts each season, of repertoire ranging from Renaissance polyphony through contemporary American.

The Fifth Avenue Choir is made up of professional singers from the Chamber Choir as well as a dedicated team of volunteer choristers from the Fifth Avenue congregation. From September to June, the choir sings in worship on Sunday mornings at the 11 am service and at special seasonal services.

The Community Choir is an ensemble for those who would like to learn more about singing and music in general, and have a good time with like-minded people in the process! There is no audition to join this group—we meet on Thursdays from 6 until 8 pm, and spend our time learning about our voices and improving our varied abilities to read music. Approximately twice a month, the Community Choir sings at the 11 am worship service.

ABOUT KIRKLAND CHAPEL

Kirkland Chapel was designed in the Gothic style by New York architect James Gamble Rogers. Rogers also designed the Harkness Tower in Yale University's Memorial Quadrangle. Funded in large part through the generosity of philanthropist Anna M. Harkness, the Chapel and Church House were constructed in 1925, a half-century after the Sanctuary of Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church was completed. The Chapel is named for the Rev. Dr. Bryant M. Kirkland, senior pastor of Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church from 1962 until 1987.

Kirkland Chapel is an ideal venue for small ensembles and chamber music with its warm, intimate ambience and fine acoustics—features due in large part to its hard stone surfaces and lack of carpeting. In addition to housing a fine grand piano, the Chapel is home to a small pipe organ built in 1970 by the Austin Organ Company of Hartford, Connecticut.
