

If You Are New Here

ANTHEM

Isaiah 62

WORSHIP NOTES

Emma Lou Diemer was born and raised in Kansas City, Missouri, where she began playing the piano and composing at a very early age. (At 13, she became the organist of her home church!) A graduate of Yale and Eastman, Dr. Diemer studied with Paul Hindemith, Howard Hanson and Roger Sessions. Over the course of her career, she has received many awards, including Fulbright and Ford Foundation grants. The versatility of her compositions, particularly her choral works, have made her one of the most widely performed American composers of the last century. Her setting of "The Lord is Mindful," this morning's Anthem, was composed in 1979.

The Offertory Anthem, "What Does the Lord Require of You?", was written in 2005 by Mark Miller. Miller currently serves as assistant professor of church music at Drew Theological School and is a lecturer in the practice of sacred music at Yale University. He is also the minister of music at Christ Church in Summit, New Jersey. Miller's memorable setting of this famous reading from Micah playfully combines two primary musical inspirations: the African American gospel tradition, and the Baroque contrapuntal style of J.S. Bach.


