

PRAYER FOR ILLUMINATION

Scripture Lesson

Matthew 2:1-18

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet: 'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel.'" Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage."


When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

Now after they had left, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, "Get up, take the child and his mother, and flee to Egypt, and remain there until I tell you; for Herod is about to search for the child, to destroy him." Then Joseph got up, took the child and his mother by night, and went to Egypt, and remained there until the death of Herod. This was to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet, "Out of Egypt I have called my son."

When Herod saw that he had been tricked by the wise men, he was infuriated, and he sent and killed all the children in and around Bethlehem who were two years old or under, according to the time that he had learned from the wise men. Then was fulfilled what had been spoken through the prophet Jeremiah: "A voice was heard in Ramah, wailing and loud lamentation, Rachel weeping for her children; she refused to be consoled, because they are no more."



Worship Notes

The choral and organ music this morning was chosen to mark of the feast of Epiphany, officially celebrated today as we conclude the 12 days of Christmas. Epiphany is the time when Christians remember the Wise Men (sometimes called the Three Kings) who visited Jesus in his infancy.

Both the Prelude and the Communion Anthem feature one of the oldest and most famous Epiphany hymns, *Wie schön leuchtet der Morgenstern* ("How Brightly Shines the Morning Star"). The hymn was composed by Philipp Nicolai in 1597. Buxtehude's variations on the tune are playful and colorful, allowing the organist to show off many lighter colors in the organ. Mendelssohn includes the entire first verse of the hymn toward the end of *There Shall a Star Come Out of Jacob*, which is the opening chorus of his unfinished oratorio on the life of Jesus, *Christus*.

The Anthem, Jonathan Dove's *The Three Kings*, is a wonderful and evocative piece for *a cappella* choir composed in 2004. In his introductory note to the piece, Dove writes, "Dorothy L. Sayers' poem *The Three Kings* was suggested to me as a carol text by Stephen Cleobury [director of music at King's College, Cambridge]. Sayers achieves a surprising emotional power and mystery by portraying the youngest king, the nearest to childhood, as the saddest, bringing a gift of myrrh which anticipates Christ's passion and death; it is the oldest king, nearest to the grave, who brings golden toys. I have tried to catch this surprise in the music: the first two verses are simple and ballad like, while the third verse suddenly opens up like a treasure chest of twinkling gold."


