





Scripture Lesson

Luke 10:25-37

Just then a lawyer stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he said, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" He said to him, "What is written in the law? What do you read there?" He answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." And he said to him, "You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live." But wanting to justify himself, he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" Jesus replied, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and went away, leaving him half dead. Now by chance a priest was going down that road; and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. Worship Notes

The Anthem is one of several famous pieces for double choir composed by the great English choral composer William Harris. Harris was professor of organ and harmony at the Royal College of Music from 1921 until 1955; he also became organist at St. George's Chapel, Windsor in 1933 and directed the music for the coronation ceremony of King George VI in 1937, as well as for Queen Elizabeth II's coronation in 1953. This morning's Anthem, *Bring us, O Lord God*, was composed rather late in his career, in 1959. Scored for double choir *a cappella*, the piece is a beautiful setting of a religious poem by John Donne. Harris' musical language is evocative and spacious, and together with Donne's mystical text, paints a radiant picture of heaven. The piece builds to a grand, resplendent climax on the words, 'World without end,' but the most intimate and reflective music is saved for the transcendental, concluding 'Amens.'

The Offertory Anthem this morning is John Ireland's most enduring work for the church, and one of the cornerstones of the great English choral tradition: *Greater Love Hath No Man*. Composed in 1912, the text of this Edwardian anthem is a collage of Scriptural excerpts assembled by the composer himself. Ireland's choice of New Testament texts, which speak of self-giving sacrifice, has traditionally made this anthem a popular selection for services of remembrance. When considered through the lens of this morning's reading from Luke, however, the text of this masterpiece takes on even broader implications: at every moment we can choose to lay ourselves down—our concepts, beliefs, opinions and prejudices—in favor of the radically unconditional and sacrificial love modeled for us by Jesus. Through God's redeeming love, we are called to "present our bodies, a holy, *living* sacrifice," to live as the walking, talking body of Christ alive and at work in the world today.


