





Postlude

WORSHIP NOTES

The organ music this morning was composed by the great 19th-century French organist and composer César Franck, organist at the church of Ste. Clotilde in Paris for more than 30 years. Toward the end of his life, Franck wrote three major organ works, his masterpieces for the instrument, which he called *chorales*. This morning's Prelude, Chorale no. 3 in A minor, opens with an arresting toccata figuration inspired by Bach's Prelude in A minor, BWV 543, which Franck quickly contrasts with a lyrical, hymn-like theme. The middle section features one of the most beautiful Romantic melodies in the organ repertoire, which is paired powerfully with the opening toccata figuration to bring the piece to a thrilling close.

The Offertory Anthem comes from Felix Mendelssohn's *Elijah*, an English-language oratorio written in 1846 for a music festival in Birmingham, England. *Elijah* depicts various events in the life of the Biblical prophet, and many of the texts are drawn from the first and second book of Kings, as well as the Psalms. "Blessed are the men who fear Him" is one of the most well-known and frequently performed choruses from this beloved oratorio.

The Communion Anthem, *Sicut cervus*, is an exquisite example of 16th-century Renaissance polyphony, of which Palestrina is regarded as the greatest master. This style of music is characterized by its transparent, weightless quality, which is achieved by way of the independence of each of the four voices. The tenors introduce the first thematic idea, followed by the altos, then the sopranos, and finally the basses. The interactions among the voices are characterized by an overarching consonance that is strengthened by occasional, well-controlled dissonance—a touchstone of Palestrina's inimitable style.


