

If You Are New Here




* PRAYER OF CONFESSION

WORSHIP NOTES

Herbert Howells was one of the most influential composers of English choral music in the 20th century. Born in Gloucestershire in 1892, Howells began his musical studies with the great Herbert Brewer at Gloucester Cathedral. In 1912 he won an open scholarship at the Royal College of Music, where he studied with Charles Villiers Stanford and Charles Wood, joining the faculty himself in 1920. He succeeded Gustav Holst in 1936 as director of music at St. Paul's Girls School (a post he held until 1962) and was appointed professor of music at London University in 1950. Over the course of his career, Howells' evocative and utterly distinctive compositional voice arguably redefined the aesthetics of church music from his time forward, a style inextricably linked to the magnificent architecture and acoustics of the great English cathedrals and college chapels.

Although the majority of his output was choral music, Howells also composed a small but distinguished body of music for his own instrument, the organ. The Postlude this morning is the final in a set of *Three Rhapsodies* published in 1918. *Rhapsody no. 3 in C-sharp minor* was composed in March 1918 while Howells was visiting his friend Edward Bairstow, then organist of York Minster, in the city of York. One night during Howells' visit, the city fell victim to a Zeppelin bombing raid. Unable to sleep due to the noise and anxiety, Howells composed the Rhapsody in one sitting, completing it before dawn. The extreme emotion of that experience can surely be heard in the piece's highly charged and dramatic opening gesture of descending chromatic chords. Although the softer middle section is more reflective and hopeful, the uneasy descending chromatic lines keep any sense of true peace from settling in. Sure enough, the churning, anxious opening material returns once again, but at the very height of pessimism—conveyed by a series of brooding, dissonant chords unable to find resolution—the piece takes a sudden turn, assertively ending on a triumphant major chord. The first light of a new day?

ABOUT THE PARAMENTS

This year the church has added to our collection of paraments, the liturgical cloth that adorns the pulpit and is reflected in the clergy's stoles and our processional banner. You may have noticed the bright purple Lenten paraments that we began using on Ash Wednesday. Today, with the start of Holy Week, we introduce a vivid-red parament featuring the Passover Lamb. This parament pairs beautifully with the white parament of the Risen Lamb that we used for the first time last Easter. Our paraments feature the traditional colors and symbols of the liturgical seasons. They add an important component to our worship by helping us mark the seasons of the Christian year in beautiful and tangible ways.

Music & Arts

Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church is home to a versatile program of arts in our worship and community life that endeavors to inspire, challenge and comfort all who encounter it, and to provide opportunities to share our artistic gifts. 
