



WORSHIP NOTES

Today is Trinity Sunday, the day when Christians throughout the world acknowledge and celebrate the doctrine of the Trinity, or the three Persons of God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Trinity Sunday has been widely celebrated in the Western Church on the first Sunday after Pentecost since the 13th century. Some references to the Trinity are made in several of the musical selections this morning, from the triune "Holy, Holy" of the opening hymn to the Trinitarian musical symbolism embedded throughout Bach's Prelude and Fugue in E-flat major.

J.S. Bach's monumental Prelude and Fugue in E-flat major is one of the great masterpieces for organ. The prelude is composed in what is known as the *French overture* style, a Baroque genre consisting of two contrasting musical ideas: a grand section with snappy, dotted rhythms, followed by a section of quickly-moving fugal material. This particular musical form was created in the 1650s by the famous French Baroque opera composer Jean-Baptiste Lully; it was incredibly popular and came to be widely imitated throughout Europe. Bach, the greatest stylistic synthesizer, employed the French overture style often, especially in the opening movements of his instrumental suites. In this morning's Prelude, Bach creates a powerful sense of unity by alternating between the grand and fugal sections throughout. He brings the piece to a triumphant and decisive conclusion by repeating the opening material at the end, a technique in musical composition known as "recapitulation."

The stunning fugue is nicknamed "St. Anne," because its primary subject bears a strong resemblance to the hymn tune by that name, known to most of us as "Our God, Our Help in Ages Past." Written at the height of Bach's compositional powers, this fugue is an incredibly expressive feat of musical ingenuity. It is composed in three major sections, the first of which is written in the *stile antico*, or "the old style." In Bach's time, composers would sometimes evoke musical styles of previous generations, especially late-Renaissance choral music by composers such as Palestrina. This old style is characterized by strict counterpoint and lines that are vocal in nature. This old-fashioned exposition gives way to a second section which introduces faster, more elaborate material in what is known as the *stile moderno*, or "the modern style." The musical lines in this section are much more florid and instrumental in character. One would be hard-pressed to sing them! In the third and final section of the fugue, these two seemingly contrasting styles are brought together in a brilliant synthesis: the old is merged with the new in a statement of musical cohesion and unity that continues to inspire, centuries after its composition.

Welcome, Dr. Nathan Stucky!

This morning we are delighted and honored to welcome the Rev. Dr. Nathan Stucky to the Fifth Avenue pulpit for the first time. Dr. Stucky is a professor at Princeton Theological Seminary, where he is the director of the Farminary Project, a 21-acre farm that integrates theological education with small-scale, sustainable agriculture. Dr. Stucky grew up on a farm, and after earning a bachelor of arts degree in music from Bethel College, he spent his early career either farming in Kansas or doing youth ministry on Maryland's eastern shore. He earned master of divinity and PhD degrees from Princeton Theological Seminary. Dr. Stucky is the author of the new book *Wrestling with Rest: Inviting Youth to Discover the Gift of Sabbath*.


