

Welcoming Children

Children are always welcome in worship! You will find children's Bibles and children's worship bulletins in the pews, as well as easy access to our Family Room, located just outside the Sanctuary. (See the map on the back of the bulletin for the exact location.) If you are attending worship in Kirkland Chapel, the ushers can provide a worship bag to keep your child engaged. (You may return these materials at the end of the service.) We also provide childcare for infants and toddlers from 9 am until 12:30 pm in the LaDane Williamson Christian Education Center. 

SCRIPTURE LESSONS

Matthew 18:1-5

At that time the disciples came to Jesus and asked, "Who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven?" He called a child, whom he put among them, and said, "Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. Whoever becomes humble like this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me.

I Samuel 17:31-45, 48-50

When the words that David spoke were heard, they repeated them before Saul; and he sent for him. David said to Saul, "Let no one's heart fail because of him; your servant will go and fight with this Philistine." Saul said to David, "You are not able to go against this Philistine to fight

with him; for you are just a boy, and he has been a warrior from his youth." But David said to Saul, "Your servant used to keep sheep for his father; and whenever a lion or a bear came, and took a lamb from the flock, I went after it and struck it down, rescuing the lamb from its mouth; and if it turned against me, I would catch it by the jaw, strike it down, and kill it. Your servant has killed both lions and bears; and this uncircumcised Philistine shall be like one of them, since he has defied the armies of the living God." David said, "The Lord, who saved me from the paw of the lion and from the paw of the bear, will save me from the hand of this Philistine." So Saul said to David, "Go, and may the Lord be with you!" Saul clothed David with his armor; he put a bronze helmet on his head and clothed him with a coat of mail. David strapped Saul's sword over the armor, and he tried in vain to walk, for he was not used to them. Then David said to Saul, "I cannot walk with these; for I am not used to them." So David removed them.

Then he took his staff in his hand, and chose five smooth stones from the wadi, and put them in his shepherd's bag, in the pouch; his sling was in his hand, and he drew near to the Philistine. The Philistine came on and drew near to David, with his shield-bearer in front of him. When the Philistine looked and saw David, he disdained him, for he was only a youth, ruddy and handsome in appearance. The Philistine said to David, "Am I a dog, that you come to me with sticks?" And the Philistine cursed David by his gods. The Philistine said to David, "Come to me, and I will give your flesh to the birds of the air and to the wild animals of the field." But David said to the Philistine, "You come to me with sword and spear and javelin; but I come to you in the name of the Lord of hosts, the God of the armies of Israel, whom you have defied.

When the Philistine drew nearer to meet David, David ran quickly toward the battle line to meet the Philistine. David put his hand in his bag, took out a stone, slung it, and struck the Philistine on his forehead; the stone sank into his forehead, and he fell face down on the ground. So David prevailed over the Philistine with a sling and a stone, striking down the Philistine and killing him; there was no sword in David's hand.

WORSHIP NOTES

Born in South Carolina, Carlisle Floyd was the son of a Methodist minister and composed many works reflecting life in the south. *Pilgrimage* exists in two versions: 1) voice and piano and 2) voice and orchestra. Bible verses are used for each of the five movements in this set. While the piano accompaniment is sparse and atmospheric, the vocal line is intense and melodic—quite appropriate for movement 5. Floyd states, "*I Am Persuaded* employs the text from Romans 8, which conveys the inseparability of God and His children."

The Offertory Anthem comes from Felix Mendelssohn's *Elijah*, an English-language oratorio written in 1846 for a music festival in Birmingham, England. This piece was composed in the spirit of Mendelssohn's Baroque predecessors Bach and Handel, whose music he loved. In 1829, Mendelssohn organized the first performance of Bach's *St. Matthew Passion* since the composer's death and was instrumental in bringing this and other Bach works to widespread popularity. *Elijah* depicts various events in the life of the Biblical prophet, and many of the texts are drawn from the first and second book of Kings, as well as the Psalms. "Lord God of Abraham" is one of the most well-known and frequently performed arias from this beloved oratorio.

Ralph Vaughan Williams' *Love Bade Me Welcome* is the third movement in his Five Mystical Songs set. The text, supplied by English poet and Anglican priest George Herbert, is constant. Vaughan Williams wrote four different instrumentations of this work: 1) piano solo, 2) piano and string quintet, 3) wind ensemble, and 4) orchestra. The accompaniment is fresh and supportive of the vocal line. Vaughan Williams employs numerous consecutive fifth passages, giving the accompaniment a unique texture while also recalling music from earlier times—times when consecutive fifth intervals were more common. The overall theme of this movement is welcoming and hospitable. A person is welcomed by love despite their sinful past. Thanks to Christ's crucifixion, we as humans may be welcomed, comforted and united by love.


