

Welcoming Children

Children are always welcome in worship! Families are welcome to sit anywhere in the Sanctuary, but you may want to take advantage of the first 10 rows on the far north side, which we have equipped for families with young children. You will find children's Bibles and children's worship bulletins in the pews, as well as easy access to our Family Room, located just outside the Sanctuary. (See the map on the back of the bulletin for the exact location.) If you are attending worship in Kirkland Chapel, the ushers can provide a worship bag to keep your child engaged. (You may return these materials at the end of the service.) We also provide childcare for infants and toddlers from 9 am until 12:30 pm in the LaDane Williamson Christian Education Center. WORSHIP NOTES

In honor of the Martin Luther King, Jr. national holiday, the choral and organ music this morning features arrangements of African American spirituals by some of the foremost composers in the genre. The Prelude and Postlude were composed by the American organist and composer Dennis Janzer. A native of Hartford, Wisconsin, Janzer has amassed a diverse catalogue of both sacred and secular compositions for various forces, from solo instruments through large ensembles. This morning's selections come from Janzer's two volumes of solo organ works based on African American spirituals. Janzer's imaginative and colorful settings beautifully capture and sustain the mood of each of the original spirituals upon which they are based.

The Offertory Anthem, *Hold On!*, is one of the most famous arrangements by the great Moses Hogan, one of America's foremost composers of African American spirituals. Hogan's inimitable settings are sung and beloved by choirs and audiences throughout the world. They are remarkable for stylishly bridging the gap between traditional spirituals and classical choral ensembles. Although Hogan was only 45 when he passed away from a brain tumor in 2003, his legacy lives on through his many compositions and arrangements as one of the most creative and influential figures in 20th-century American choral music.

Welcome, Aisha Brooks-Lytle!

Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church is delighted to welcome the Rev. Aisha Brooks-Lytle to our pulpit for the first time. A native of Philadelphia, Rev. Brooks-Lytle has a bachelor's degree in music from Temple University and a master of divinity degree from Princeton Theological Seminary. She spent her early career as a youth minister at Wayne Presbyterian Church in Pennsylvania, and has shared her ministry of music, preaching, teaching and pastoral care with congregations in New Jersey and New York as well. In 2018 she became the executive presbyter of the Presbytery of Greater Atlanta, a supportive network of 92 churches and more than 400 clergy that connects, equips and empowers congregations (and individuals) to carry out their missions and ministries.


