

Welcoming Children

Children are always welcome in worship! Families are welcome to sit anywhere in the Sanctuary, but you may want to take advantage of the first 10 rows on the far north side, which we have equipped for families with young children. You will find children's Bibles and children's worship bulletins in the pews, as well as easy access to our Family Room, located just outside the Sanctuary. (See the map on the back of the bulletin for the exact location.) If you are attending worship in Kirkland Chapel, the ushers can provide a worship bag to keep your child engaged. (You may return these materials at the end of the service.) We also provide childcare for infants and toddlers from 9 am until 12:30 pm in the LaDane Williamson Christian Education Center. WORSHIP NOTES

The Offertory Anthem was composed by Ralph Vaughan Williams, a leading figure in 20th-century music who wrote extensively in all genres. Vaughan Williams, an English composer, conductor and organist, made an especially important contribution to sacred music as the editor of *The English Hymnal*, which was published in 1906 and is still in use today. "O, Clap Your Hands," a festive setting of Psalm 47, was composed in 1920, shortly after Vaughan Williams returned to England from serving in the Royal Medical Corps in France during World War I. The piece was first sung at Westminster Abbey, where it was received with great enthusiasm. Through countless performances, recordings and broadcasts since that time, "O, Clap Your Hands" has become one of the most popular and famous pieces of English church music from the early 20th century.


