

If You Are New Here

Welcoming Children

Children are always welcome in worship! Families are welcome to sit anywhere in the Sanctuary, but you may want to take advantage of the first 10 rows on the far north side, which we have equipped for families with young children. You will find children's Bibles and children's worship bulletins in the pews, as well as easy access to our Family Room, located just outside the Sanctuary. (See the map on the back of the bulletin for the exact location.) If you are attending worship in Kirkland Chapel, the ushers can provide a worship bag to keep your child engaged. (You may return these materials at the end of the service.) We also provide childcare for infants and toddlers from 9 am until 12:30 pm in the LaDane Williamson Christian Education Center. 



WORSHIP NOTES

The composer of this morning's choral music and Postlude was one of the greatest in the 20th-century French organist/composer tradition: Louis Vierne. Nearly blind from birth, Vierne showed unusual musical talent as a child, and his parents enrolled him in the Paris Conservatory as soon as possible. At the conservatory, Vierne primarily studied with and served as assistant to Charles-Marie Widor, organist at the church of Saint-Sulpice (and composer of the famed Toccata, our traditional Easter postlude). In 1900 Vierne was appointed to one of the most prestigious musical posts in Paris: organist at the cathedral of Notre-Dame de Paris, a position he held until his death in 1937.

Much of Vierne's music is characterized by an underlying sense of melancholy, a characteristic that is often attributed to a lifetime of physical and emotional trials and traumas. Much of the *Solemn Mass* certainly supports this assertion, with its brooding minor modality and dense, expressive chromaticism. In spite of the overall moodiness of his music, however, there are also moments of peace and perspective, moments perhaps more reflective of the kind and generous nature described by so many of Vierne's students and colleagues.

This lighter side of Vierne's personality shines through beautifully in this morning's Postlude, *Carillon de Westminster*. The piece's tune comes from the most famous musical clock in the world—the chimes in the clock tower of the Palace of Westminster (popularly known as "Big Ben"). Rumor has it that, while composing this piece, Vierne asked his friend Henry Willis, a famous English organ builder, to hum the theme for him. Apparently Willis either hummed the tune incorrectly, or Vierne misheard it while transcribing, because the second quarter of the theme is misquoted! Nobody is sure if this story is true—perhaps Vierne simply modified the theme for his own musical purposes. In any case, Vierne's version is only slightly different from the theme that has issued from the Westminster clock tower since its construction in 1858.

New Security Measures Begin Today

At the recommendation of a Property Administration Committee task force, the church is implementing additional security measures to bring us in line with the best practices of our neighboring congregations. Fifth Avenue Is Now a Matthew 25 Congregation

In 2016 and 2018, the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA) encouraged the denomination to take to heart Jesus' teachings in the 25th chapter of Matthew's gospel, with particular attention to the needs of those who are hungry, oppressed, imprisoned or poor. At the recommendation of the Denominational Matters Committee, the Session last week approved a motion that Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church become a Matthew 25 congregation. This commitment means that the church will continue to invest in ministries that serve individuals and communities in need, identify new opportunities to address issues of justice, and share our progress with fellow PCUSA congregations. 
