



Merciful God, we confess that we have sinned against you in thought, word and deed, by what we have done, and by what we have left undone.



Scripture Lesson

Jeremiah 29:1-7

¹These are the words of the letter that the prophet Jeremiah sent from Jerusalem to the remaining elders among the exiles, and to the priests, the prophets, and all the people, whom Nebuchadnezzar had taken into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon. ²This was after King Jeconiah, and the queen mother, the court officials, the leaders of Judah and Jerusalem, the artisans, and the smiths had departed from Jerusalem. ³The letter was sent by the hand of Elasah son of Shaphan and Gemariah son of Hilkiah, whom King Zedekiah of Judah sent to Babylon to King Nebuchadnezzar of Babylon. Music

The Prelude this morning was composed by the great French organist, Maurice Duruflé. The *Prelude and Fugue on the Name of Alain* is one of his greatest pieces for organ, and was written as a memorial to Jehan Alain, a talented young French organist and composer killed during World War II. The two main themes of Duruflé's piece come from spelling Alain's name out in notation, and from Alain's *Litanies*, his most famous piece for organ and the postlude today. *Litanies* is based on a repeated chant theme that is clearly stated at the beginning of the piece. Alain's inscription at the beginning of the piece reads, "When the Christian soul in distress can no longer find new words to implore the mercy of God, it repeats the same invocation over and over again in a blind faith. The limits of reason are reached. Faith alone continues its ascent."


Most of the choral music this morning is drawn from Duruflé's sublime setting of the Requiem mass, the mass traditionally sung to commemorate the dead. Composed in 1947 and dedicated to the memory of the composer's father, the work is a masterpiece and one of the great highlights of the choral repertoire. The vast majority of the work is based on Gregorian chant. Duruflé masterfully sets these ancient melodies (among the very oldest in Western Music) in a swirl of Impressionistic harmonies and varying accompanimental textures, at once honoring the simple beauty of the original material while imbuing it with a profoundly personal expressivity.

The Fall Banner

Our Fall 2021 banner, "Rise, Refresh, Restore At The Well," is created by artist Karen Brodie. She was inspired by Fifth Avenue's journey to return to in-person worship.

Karen shares, "The banner design reminds us we have the deep well of living water before us always to drink of, and find new and restored life in. The well, infused with the Holy Spirit and richly overflowing with abundance reminds us of our participation in building the bricks and mortar of a container. God's abundance is ever-present and ever refreshing. The well structure reminds us we are a part of this relationship of love too. It, and the water, may remind us of our baptism when we promised to live with God's help. We are trusting that, like a seed, God offers us all we need to find this healing new life. In this way, we can rise to new life, hearing God's call and purposefully choosing God's kingdom. Thanks be to God."

INTRODUCTION The Rev. Dr. Scott Black Johnston

A Reading from John Donne Meditation XVII of Devotions upon Emergent Occasions

The Church is catholic, universal, so are all her actions; all that she does belongs to all. When she baptizes a child, that action concerns me; for that child is thereby connected to that body which is my head too and ingrafted into that body whereof I am a member. And when [the Church] buries a person, that action concerns me. All [of humanity] is of one author, and is one volume; when one [person] dies, one chapter is not torn out of the book, but translated into a better language; and every chapter must be so translated. God employs several translators; some pieces are translated by age, some by sickness, some by war, some by justice; but [the Lord's] hand is in every translation, and [God's] hand shall bind up all our scattered leaves again for that library where every book shall lie open to one another. As therefore the bell that rings to a sermon calls not upon the preacher only but upon the congregation to come, so this bell calls us all...

No [one] is an island entire of itself; every[one] is a piece of the continent, a part of the main. If a clod be washed away by the sea, Europe is the less, as well as if a promontory were, as well as if a manor of thy friend's or of thine own were. Any[one's] death diminishes me, because I am involved in [hu]mankind, and therefore never send to know for whom the bell tolls; it tolls for thee.


