Parking



Scripture Lesson

Luke 9:28-36; 2 Corinthians 3:17-4:2

Luke 9:28-36

Now about eight days after these sayings Jesus took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. And while he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly they saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. They appeared in glory and were speaking of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. Now Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep; but since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him. Just as they were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, "Master, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah" —not knowing what he said. While he was saying this, a cloud came and overshadowed them; and they were terrified as they entered the cloud. Then from the cloud came a voice that said, "This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!" When the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. And they kept silent and in those days told no one any of the things they had seen.

Now the Lord is the Spirit, and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom. Music

In November 1952, Herbert Howells was invited to compose a short introit for the coronation service of Queen Elizabeth II on June 2, 1953. The text was to be two verses from Psalm 84 beginning with, "Behold, O God our defender." Howells finished composing the piece at the end of that year on Christmas Day, and the results were stunning. Although it is relatively short, *Behold, O God our defender* is a gem containing many of the musical qualities that made Howells one of the greatest choral composers of the 20th-century: long, soaring vocal phrases; evocative modal harmonies; and the uncanny capacity to evoke both breathtaking grandeur and profoundly personal piety almost simultaneously. This piece is a highlight of the great English choral tradition.

The *Te Deum*, which dates from the fourth century, is one of the earliest hymns of the Western church and has been sung throughout history on the occasion of church festivals and celebrations. The text of the hymn follows the outline of the Apostles' Creed, mixing a poetic vision of the heavenly liturgy with its declaration of faith. It has been set to music countless times, and Benjamin Britten's Festival *Te Deum* in E major is one of the most famous and popular of the twentieth century. It was composed for the centenary Festival of St. Mark's Church in Swindon in 1944. The first section is for the full choir in unison over light chords in the organ, and is evocative of the floating, timeless qualities of Gregorian chant. On the words, "Thou art the King of Glory," the piece changes character entirely, becoming extremely rhythmic and jubilant, and alternates dramatically between the choir and the organ. A soprano soloist introduces the final section of the piece, and it closes in the same chant-like character as the opening.
