SCRIPTURE LESSON Luke 15:1-3, 11b-32

Now all the tax collectors and sinners were coming near to listen to him. And the Pharisees and the scribes were grumbling and saying, "This fellow welcomes sinners and eats with them." So he told them this parable:

"There was a man who had two sons. The younger of them said to his father, 'Father, give me the share of the property that will belong to me.' So he divided his property between them. A few days later the younger son gathered all he had and traveled to a distant country, and there he squandered his property in dissolute living. When he had spent everything, a severe famine took place throughout that country, and he began to be in need. So he went and hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, who sent him to his fields to feed the pigs. He would gladly have filled himself with the pods that the pigs were eating; and no one gave him anything. But when he came to himself he said, 'How many of my father's hired hands have bread enough and to spare, but here I am dying of hunger! I will get up and go to my father, and I will say to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son; treat me like one of your hired hands." So he set off and went to his father. But while he was still far off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion; he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him. Then the son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son.' But the father said to his slaves, 'Quickly, bring out a robe-the best one-and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. And get the fatted calf and kill it, and let us eat and celebrate; for this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found!' And they began to celebrate. "Now his elder son was in the field; and when he came and approached the house, he heard music and dancing. He called one of the slaves and asked what was going on. He replied, 'Your brother has come, and your father has killed the fatted calf, because he has got him back safe and sound.' Then he became angry and refused to go in. His father came out and began to plead with him. But he answered his father, 'Listen! For all these years I have been working like a slave for you, and I have never disobeyed your command; yet you have never given me even a young goat so that I might celebrate with my friends. But when this son of yours came back, who has devoured your property with prostitutes, you killed the fatted calf for him!' Then the father said to him, 'Son, you are always with me, and all that is mine is yours. But we had to celebrate and rejoice, because this brother of yours was dead and has come to life; he was lost and has been found.'"

Worship Notes

The Anthem was composed in 2002 by the American composer Stephen Paulus. Over the course of his life, Paulus composed 150 works for chorus ranging from his moving Holocaust oratorio, *To Be Certain of the Dawn*, to the poignant anthem, *Pilgrims' Hymn*, sung at the funerals of Presidents Reagan and Ford. His works have received thousands of performances and recordings all over the world. The melody for *The Road Home* is derived from *The Lone Wild Bird*, an adaptation of the early nineteenth-century American folksong *Prospect*. Paulus found several texts inspired by this tune, but none of them seemed quite right for the slightly melancholy air of the melody. He turned to his longtime collaborator, poet Michael Dennis Browne, and commissioned a new text, which resulted in *The Road Home*. With the old tune married to new words, Paulus then made the piece his own with innovative harmonies and his signature, rich choral textures. Stephen Paulus passed away in October 2014 at the age of 65 due to complications arising from a stroke he suffered in July 2013.

Just As I Am is a very well-known hymn text, written by Charlotte Elliott in 1835. In his book, Hymns and Hymn Writers of the Church Hymnary, John Brownlie says that Elliott wrote the poem in one sitting following a painful period of spiritual questioning and growth: "The troubles of the night came back upon her with such force that she felt they must be met and conquered in the grace of God. She gathered up in her soul the great certainties, not of her emotions, but of her salvation: her Lord, His power, His promise. And taking pen and paper from the table she deliberately set down in writing, for her own comfort, 'the formulae of her faith.'" Bob Chilcott's setting for choir and organ is powerful in its simplicity, allowing the message of the text to speak for itself directly.

The John Brodhead Romeyn Task Force Invites Input

Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church recently discovered that John Brodhead Romeyn, the church's founding pastor, owned a household slave, Betsey Jackson. Jackson was a charter member of this church in 1808. Other early members of the congregation were also slaveholders. Jackson was later freed and Romeyn eventually criticized the institution of slavery. A task force (Eric Daniels, Dale Hansen, Scott Black Johnston, Erica Moffett and Nancy Moore) has been formed to consider how best to take account of this history. How should this church exhibit honesty about our past, contrition in regard to our mistakes, and look forward with hope to envision the church God is calling us to be?
