

SCRIPTURE LESSON

Luke 10:25-37

Just then a lawyer stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he said, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" He said to him, "What is written in the law? What do you read there?" He answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." And he said to him, "You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live." But wanting to justify himself, he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" Jesus replied, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and went away, leaving him half dead. WORSHIP NOTES

Handel's *Messiah*, one of the most popular oratorios in the canon of classical music, is full of exceptionally memorable movements: "The Trumpet Shall Sound," "Worthy is the Lamb," "I Know That My Redeemer Liveth," and of course, the beloved "Hallelujah" chorus. This oratorio, which is divided into three parts outlining the liturgical year, contains 53 movements. This morning's excerpt, an aria, is the beginning of part three, which focuses on Christ's redemption and glorification in heaven. The uplifting and optimistic nature of the text is not reflected in a musically bombastic manner. Instead, Handel sets the words to pastoral-like music. Its gentle lilt coupled with its repetitive motifs underscore the hope and inevitability of Christ's resurrection.

This morning's second solo is a stand-alone work by Franz Joseph Haydn. Known as the "Father of the Symphony," Haydn also contributed to the development of the string quartet and piano trio. Some of his larger choral works include *The Creation, The Seasons* and several masses. Through our modern eyes, his musical connections were stunning: he was a friend of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart (1756–1791) and a teacher of Ludwig van Beethoven (1770–1827). Haydn was a cheerful individual, and his joyous and spirited demeanor is conveyed through much of his writing, including "When I Think Upon Thy Goodness."
