

PRAYER FOR ILLUMINATION

Scripture Lesson

Psalm 104:1-26

Bless the Lord, O my soul. O Lord my God, you are very great. You are clothed with honor and majesty, wrapped in light as with a garment. You stretch out the heavens like a tent, you set the beams of your chambers on the waters, you make the clouds your chariot, you ride on the wings of the wind, you make the winds your messengers, fire and flame your ministers.

You set the earth on its foundations, so that it shall never be shaken. You cover it with the deep as with a garment; the waters stood above the mountains. At your rebuke they flee; at the sound of your thunder they take to flight. They rose up to the mountains, ran down to the valleys to the place that you appointed for them. You set a boundary that they may not pass, so that they might not again cover the earth.

You make springs gush forth in the valleys; they flow between the hills, giving drink to every wild animal; the wild asses quench their thirst. By the streams the birds of the air have their habitation; they sing among the branches. From your lofty abode you water the mountains; the earth is satisfied with the fruit of your work. You cause the grass to grow for the cattle, and plants for people to use, to bring forth food from the earth, and wine to gladden the human heart, oil to make the face shine, and bread to strengthen the human heart.

The trees of the Lord are watered abundantly, the cedars of Lebanon that he planted. In them the birds build their nests; the stork has its home in the fir trees. The high mountains are for the wild goats; the rocks are a refuge for the coneys.

You have made the moon to mark the seasons; the sun knows its time for setting. You make darkness, and it is night, when all the animals of the forest come creeping out. The young lions roar for their prey, seeking their food from God. When the sun rises, they withdraw and lie down in their dens. People go out to their work and to their labor until the evening.

O Lord, how manifold are your works! In wisdom you have made them all; the earth is full of your creatures. Yonder is the sea, great and wide, creeping things innumerable are there, living things both small and great. There go the ships, and Leviathan that you formed to sport in it.

Music

The Anthem, *In beauty may I walk*, was composed by the brilliant British composer Jonathan Dove. The words come from an anonymous prayer of the Navajo people, translated by poet Jerome Rothenberg. This lovely musical setting is based on an evocative, mantra-like theme that is sung repeatedly throughout much of the piece, primarily in the bass part. The repetition of this theme seems at once to plant the music firmly in the ground, while lending it an air of weightlessness, as though suspended in time. In a contrasting middle section, the staccato sound of birdsong can be heard in the upper voices, ornamenting the words "beautifully, joyful." The original mantra-like theme returns, leading the piece to an awesome climax before ending gently in quiet wonder.

The Offertory Anthem, also by Jonathan Dove, is the *Gloria* from his *Missa Brevis* (Short Mass), a work commissioned by the Cathedral Organists' Association in the U.K. *Missa Brevis* was premiered by the choir of Wells Cathedral in 2009 and was chosen for the BBC's Christmas Day worship broadcast in 2009. Since that time, *Missa Brevis* has become one of the most popular contemporary settings of the Mass, and has been performed in countless services throughout the world. The *Gloria* is characteristic of Dove's distinctive minimalist style, featuring catchy rhythmic motives, ingenious thematic prolongation, and captivating interplay between the choir and organ.

Fall Banner

The liturgical banner in today's service was created especially for our fall sermon series by the Canadian artist Karen Brodie. Brodie has been creating fabric art from her studio in British Columbia since 1991. Liturgical art, now the main focus of her work, has been commissioned by churches across North America and beyond. Of the banner she created for Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church, Brodie writes: "The inspiration for this banner is taken from two hymns, 'All Things Bright and Beautiful' and 'God of the Sparrow.' They speak eloquently of how God is in all: in bright beauty, in flora and fauna, in seasons, in mountain splendor, in sunsets and forests and tiny green blades of grass, yet also in sorrow, hunger, those who are sick and empty tombs. How do we find a language for awe and praise, gratitude and grace? How do we see with the eyes of God so that we also may see Christ in each part of Creation? If we disregard loving and caring for our island home, not just a gift of God, but part of God, we desecrate the holy."

Skinner Shelter, a volunteer-run, 12-bed men's shelter (currently closed due to Covid concerns); the Ecumenical Outreach Partnership, a collaborative ministry with Saint Thomas Church and St. Patrick's Cathedral that serves the homeless population of Midtown; A Place at the Table, a free, twiceweekly lunch for our homeless and hungry neighbors; and Meals on Heels, a Saturday-morning meal preparation and delivery to homebound seniors.
