

Worship Notes

The composer of this morning's Anthem, Dr. Rosephanye Powell, has been hailed as one of America's premier women composers of solo vocal and choral music. As a choral composer, Dr. Powell has an impressive catalogue of works published by some of the nation's leading publishers, and is commissioned yearly to compose for choruses of every level and description. An accomplished singer and voice professor, Dr. Powell serves as professor of voice at Auburn University in Alabama, where her research focuses on the art of the African American spiritual and voice care concerns for professional vocalists. She travels the country and internationally presenting lectures and song demonstrations, and serving as a workshop clinician, conductor and adjudicator for solo vocal competitions and auditions, honor choirs, choral workshops and festivals. Dr. Powell has received numerous awards, including the Living Legend Award, presented by the California State University African Diaspora Sacred Music Festival in Los Angeles. She was listed in the first edition of the international publication *Who Is Who in Choral Music*, and has been included in *Who's Who Among America's Teachers and Outstanding Young Women in America* in recent years.

This morning's Anthem, *The Word Was God*, is one of Dr. Powell's most famous compositions. Its layering and phrasing of a catchy rhythmic motif, beautifully contrasted with a haunting lyricism in the middle section, make it a popular showpiece for accomplished choirs.

The composer of the Offertory Anthem is one of the most important living American composers: Ned Rorem. Rorem was born in Richmond, Indiana, in 1923 and spent most of his youth in Chicago. He received his musical training at the American Conservatory of Music, Northwestern University, the Curtis Institute in Philadelphia and the Juilliard School. Particularly renowned for his art songs, Rorem has also composed operas, symphonies and pieces for chamber ensembles. In 1976, Rorem received the Pulitzer Prize in Music recognizing his suite *Air Music: Ten Etudes of Orchestra*, which was first performed in Cincinnati in December 1975. Rorem has composed extensively for choir and written several pieces for solo organ.

Praise the Lord, O My Soul is a wonderful example of Rorem's up-tempo and rhythmic choral style—the musical language is fundamentally tonal, with punchy chromaticism that is usually playful, sometimes a bit startling, often resulting in harmonies evocative of jazz.
