



WORSHIP NOTES

The Prelude this morning is by Frank Bridge, an excellent composer in his own right, but probably best remembered as the composition teacher of Benjamin Britten. Bridge's *Adagio* in E major is a true gem of the organ repertoire, taking the listener on a journey through the full dynamic range of the instrument—from the softest softs, to the loudest louds, and back again.

The *Te Deum*, which dates from the fourth century, is one of the earliest hymns of the Western church and has been sung throughout history on the occasion of church festivals and celebrations. The text of the hymn follows the outline of the Apostles' Creed, mixing a poetic vision of the heavenly liturgy with its declaration of faith. It has been set to music countless times, and Benjamin Britten's *Festival Te Deum* in E major is one of the most famous and popular of the 20th century. It was composed for the centenary Festival of St. Mark's Church in Swindon in 1944. The first section is for the full choir in unison over light chords in the organ, and is evocative of the floating, timeless qualities of Gregorian chant. On the words, "Thou art the King of Glory," the piece changes character entirely, becoming extremely rhythmic and jubilant, and alternates dramatically between the choir and the organ. A soprano soloist introduces the final section of the piece, and it closes in the same chant-like character as its opening.
