



The Paschal Candle

Today Christians mark the end of the liturgical season that follows Pentecost (often called Ordinary Time). Today we focus on the victory of the crucified and risen Christ. We look back to Easter and forward to the coming of Christ.

On Easter Sunday, we lit the Paschal Candle to represent the new light of the resurrection, which banishes the death and darkness of Good Friday. Today, on Christ the King Sunday, we will remove the Paschal Candle from the Sanctuary.

With this act, we acknowledge that we remain imperfect people in an imperfect world. We acknowledge that God's work is not yet done. And we prepare for the season of Advent, during which we will wait once again for the coming of Christ into our hearts and our world.

Worship Notes

The Offertory Anthem is a powerful chorus from Aaron Copland's opera *The Tender Land*, which tells the story of a farm family in the Midwest. Copland was inspired to write this opera after viewing the Depression-era photographs of Walker Evans and reading James Agee's *Let Us Now Praise Famous Men*. He wrote the work between 1952 and 1954 for the NBC Television Opera Workshop with the intention of its being presented on television, but it was ultimately rejected by the producers. Eventually, the work had its premiere on April 1, 1954, at the New York City Opera. "The Promise of Living" is perhaps the most famous excerpt from *The Tender Land*. Originally composed for vocal quintet and orchestra, the arrangement heard this morning is Copland's famous anthem arrangement for five-part choir accompanied by piano duet.

Skinner Shelter, a 12-bed men's shelter (currently closed due to Covid concerns); the Ecumenical Outreach Partnership, a collaborative ministry with Saint Thomas Church and St. Patrick's Cathedral that serves the homeless population of Midtown; A Place at the Table, a twice-weekly sidewalk lunch for our homeless and hungry neighbors; and Meals on Heels, Saturday-morning meal preparation and delivery to homebound seniors.
