



#### SCRIPTURE LESSON

Matthew 2:1-12

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet: 'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel." Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage."

#### WORSHIP NOTES

#### Music

The choral and organ music this morning was chosen to mark of the feast of Epiphany, officially celebrated on Friday, Jan. 6, following the 12 days of Christmas. Epiphany is the time when Christians remember the Wise Men (sometimes called the Three Kings) who visited Jesus in his childhood.

The Prelude features one of the oldest and most famous Epiphany hymns, *Wie schön leuchtet der Morgenstern* ("How Brightly Shines the Morning Star"), composed by Philipp Nicolai in 1597. Buxtehude's variations on the tune are playful and colorful, allowing the organist to show off many lighter colors of the organ.

#### Star Words

The use of star words, also called "star gifts," is a prayer practice connected to Epiphany and the New Year that has been growing in popularity among Protestant churches for nearly a decade. Star words, written on small slips of paper, are intended to be used as a tool—a prayer, a reminder or an intention for the year. Individuals are encouraged to place their star words somewhere they will see them often to encourage this act of reflection year-round.

This tradition makes several theological statements:

- 1. The Magi followed a star, which ultimately led them to Jesus. Therefore, we also use all the resources available to us—including creative prayer practices and intention words for the new year—to move closer to Jesus.
- 2. We trust that God uses multiple ways to guide and speak to us. Star words are one such lens, offering us a way to look for God in our midst, both actively and in hindsight.
- 3. For many, the most common way of connecting with God is through spoken prayer, as opposed to silence or contemplation. Star words invite a new prayer rhythm of reflection and review that can be a powerful new way to connect with God.
- 4. Rather than sorting through or selecting our star words, we practice the spiritual task of receiving. We are not in control of this moment. Instead, we trust that God is present, and we let go of our desire to cultivate or control.

## If You Are in Need of Prayer
