



Prayer for Illumination

Scripture Lesson

Colossians 3:1-12

So if you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth, for you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ who is your life is revealed, then you also will be revealed with him in glory.

Put to death, therefore, whatever in you is earthly: fornication, impurity, passion, evil desire, and greed (which is idolatry). On account of these the wrath of God is coming on those who are disobedient. These are the ways you also once followed, when you were living that life.

But now you must get rid of all such things—anger, wrath, malice, slander, and abusive language from your mouth. Do not lie to one another, seeing that you have stripped off the old self with its practices and have clothed yourselves with the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge according to the image of its creator. In that renewal there is no longer Greek and Jew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave and free; but Christ is all and in all!

Worship Notes

Daniel Pinkham's *Alleluia! Now is the Darkness Past* is notable for its distinctive use of modes, non-traditional musical scales such as Dorian, Mixolydian, and Phrygian. These modal scales deviate from the standard major and minor tonalities that we hear most often today, lending the music a distinctively medieval or Renaissance-like quality. By emphasizing modal harmony, Pinkham creates a striking sonic landscape that feels at once ancient and modern, evoking a sense of spiritual connection across time and culture.

Judas Maccabaeus is an oratorio composed by Handel in 1746. It tells the story of the Jewish hero Judas Maccabeus, who led the Maccabean Revolt against the oppressive Seleucid Empire in the 2nd century BCE. Throughout the oratorio, Judas leads the Jewish army to several victories against the Seleucids, culminating in the recapture and rededication of the Holy Temple in Jerusalem, an event commemorated by the Jewish holiday of Hanukkah.

The final chorus of the oratorio, "Hallelujah, Amen," emerges as a triumphant proclamation, resonating with a joyful spirit of liberation. As the people in the story of Judas Maccabaeus rejoice in their newfound freedom, their exuberant alleluias parallel the sense of liberation celebrated by Christians throughout the season of Easter.

TODAY CREDO: Foundations of Christian Theology - The Belhar Confession

This spring we invite you to join us for our annual series on foundations of Christian theology, CREDO, led by our very own clergy.
