

SCRIPTURE LESSON

John 8:1-11 – The Message

Jesus went across to Mount Olives, but he was soon back in the Temple again. Swarms of people came to him. He sat down and taught them.

The religious scholars and Pharisees led in a woman who had been caught in an act of adultery. 

WORSHIP NOTES

The choral music this morning comes from William Byrd's *Mass for Four Voices*, one of the most beloved and celebrated pieces of Renaissance choral music. Composed during the reign of Queen Elizabeth I around 1592, the *Mass for Four Voices* is one of three Mass settings Byrd wrote in London in the early 1590s (the others are for three and five voices, respectively). Byrd was Roman Catholic in post-Reformation England at a time when performing the Roman Catholic Latin Mass was illegal. As such, Byrd's masses were originally published without any information to identify the publisher, and without protective covers, which made them easier to carry around and conceal. As these pieces needed to be sung in secret, they were not grandly composed with the intention of being performed in large cathedrals, but as intimate chamber works meant to be sung in small private chapels of the aristocracy by only one or two people on each part. Because they could not be widely heard during his lifetime, Byrd's Masses were largely forgotten for many years. Happily, over the last century or so they have returned to their rightful place as often-performed pinnacles of the choral tradition.
