

# WORSHIP NOTES

The final anthem this afternoon is a piece composed by British composer, John Tavener in 1993. *May Flights of Angels* is characterized by a distinctive sound inspired by the music of the Eastern Orthodox Church: an F is sustained by various voices throughout the duration of the work, interwoven with beautiful chant-like settings of the texts. Although those of us who are not members of the Orthodox Church traditionally avoid Alleluias during Lent and other somber occasions, solemn Alleluias are an important feature of these times for Orthodox Christians, as a representation of the light that is always present, even in the darkest moments.
