#### Parking



This morning's anthem is Randall Thompson's "Alleluia," a masterwork of American choral music composed in 1940 during the early days of World War II. Commissioned for the inaugural season of the Berkshire Music Center at Tanglewood, Thompson surprised many by choosing not to compose a triumphant fanfare, but a meditative and introspective setting of a single word. In our tradition, "Alleluia" is often spoken as an extroverted exclamation of unalloyed joy and celebration, yet Thompson's setting reveals a more nuanced emotional landscape—one that embraces stillness, sorrow, and quiet hope. The result is a hauntingly beautiful anthem that invites deep reflection on the many meanings this sacred word can hold.

The Offertory Anthem was composed by Ralph Vaughan Williams, a leading figure in twentiethcentury music who wrote extensively in all genres. Williams, an English composer, conductor, and organist, also made an important contribution to sacred music as the editor of The English Hymnal, which was published in 1906 and is still in use today.

Today's organ postlude first came into existence as a fantastical improvisation based on the theme of one of the oldest Easter hymns, *Victimae paschali laudes* ("Christians, to the Paschal Victim, offer your praises"), which dates from the 11th century. This piece was improvised spontaneously by the great French organist Charles Tournemire for a recording session in 1930, and is based on the traditional Gregorian melody. In 1958, Tournemire's student, Maurice Duruflé, undertook the painstaking task of transcribing these recorded improvisations into musical notation. This job must have taken countless hours, especially in an age long before digital media players, but Duruflé's devotion and effort resulted in several thrilling and innovative additions to the organ repertoire.

#### TODAY: CREDO: Mothers of the Messiah | Tamar

This year, our clergy will explore the matrilineal ancestry of Jesus in the Gospel of Matthew, focusing on Tamar, Rahab, Ruth, and Bathsheba. These women, from diverse backgrounds, demonstrated extraordinary strength, resilience, and courage. Their stories offer profound insights into faith, redemption, and God's grace. The Rev. Dr. Jonah So opens the series with Tamar (Genesis 38), who courageously confronted injustice when denied the protection owed by her father-in-law, Judah. Tamar's story challenges us to consider courage, justice, and God's surprising work through human lives.
