



SCRIPTURE LESSON

Exodus 16

Sienna Toung, Youth Elder Suri Wong, Youth Elder Elect

The whole congregation of the Israelites set out from Elim; and Israel came to the wilderness of Sin, which is between Elim and Sinai, on the fifteenth day of the second month after they had departed from the land of Egypt. The whole congregation of the Israelites complained against Moses and Aaron in the wilderness. The Israelites said to them,

Congregation: "If only we had died by the hand of the Lord in the land of Egypt, when we sat by the fleshpots and ate our fill of bread; for you have brought us out into this wilderness to kill this whole assembly with hunger."

Then the Lord said to Moses,

"I am going to rain bread from heaven for you, and each day the people shall go out and gather enough for that day. In that way I will test them, whether they will follow my instruction or not.

On the sixth day, when they prepare what they bring in, it will be twice as much as they gather on other days."

So Moses and Aaron said to all the Israelites,

"In the evening you shall know that it was the Lord who brought you out of the land of Egypt, and in the morning you shall see the glory of the Lord, because he has heard your complaining against the Lord. For what are we, that you complain against us?"

And Moses said,

"When the Lord gives you meat to eat in the evening and your fill of bread in the morning, because the Lord has heard the complaining that you utter against him—what are we? Your complaining is not against us but against the Lord."

Then Moses said to Aaron,

"Say to the whole congregation of the Israelites, 'Draw near to the Lord, for he has heard your complaining."

And as Aaron spoke to the whole congregation of the Israelites, they looked toward the wilderness, and the glory of the Lord appeared in the cloud. The Lord spoke to Moses and said,

"I have heard the complaining of the Israelites; say to them, 'At twilight you shall eat meat, and in the morning you shall have your fill of bread; then you shall know that I am the Lord your God."

In the evening quails came up and covered the camp; and in the morning there was a layer of dew around the camp. When the layer of dew lifted, there on the surface of the wilderness was a fine flaky substance, as fine as frost on the ground. When the Israelites saw it, they said to one another,

Congregation: "What is it?"

For they did not know what it was. Moses said to them,

"It is the bread that the Lord has given you to eat. This is what the Lord has commanded: 'Gather as much of it as each of you needs, an omer to a person according to the number of persons, all providing for those in their own tents.'"

The Israelites did so, some gathering more, some less. But when they measured it with an omer, those who gathered much had nothing over, and those who gathered little had no shortage; they gathered as much as each of them needed. And Moses said to them,

"Let no one leave any of it over until morning."

But they did not listen to Moses; some left part of it until morning, and it bred worms and became foul. And Moses was angry with them. Morning by morning they gathered it, as much as each needed; but when the sun grew hot, it melted.

On the sixth day they gathered twice as much food, two omers apiece. When all the leaders of the congregation came and told Moses, he said to them,

"This is what the Lord has commanded: 'Tomorrow is a day of solemn rest, a holy sabbath to the Lord; bake what you want to bake and boil what you want to boil, and all that is left over put aside to be kept until morning."

So they put it aside until morning, as Moses commanded them; and it did not become foul, and there were no worms in it. Moses said,

"Eat it today, for today is a sabbath to the Lord; today you will not find it in the field. Six days you shall gather it; but on the seventh day, which is a sabbath, there will be none."

On the seventh day some of the people went out to gather, and they found none. The Lord said to Moses.

"How long will you refuse to keep my commandments and instructions? See! The Lord has given you the sabbath, therefore on the sixth day he gives you food for two days; each of you stay where you are; do not leave your place on the seventh day."

So the people rested on the seventh day. The house of Israel called it manna; it was like coriander seed, white, and the taste of it was like wafers made with honey. Moses said,

"This is what the Lord has commanded: 'Let an omer of it be kept throughout your generations, in order that they may see the food with which I fed you in the wilderness, when I brought you out of the land of Egypt.'"

And Moses said to Aaron,

"Take a jar, and put an omer of manna in it, and place it before the Lord, to be kept throughout your generations."

As the Lord commanded Moses, so Aaron placed it before the covenant, for safekeeping. The Israelites ate manna forty years, until they came to a habitable land; they ate manna, until they came to the border of the land of Canaan. An omer is a tenth of an ephah.

This is the Word of God; for the People of God.

All: Thanks be to God.



WORSHIP NOTES

The great English composer, Gerald Finzi, wrote *God Is Gone Up* for a St. Cecilia's Day celebration at St. Sepulchre Anglican Church in central London in 1951. Finzi chose the words of American poet Edward Taylor (1646?–1729) to serve as the text for this, his most famous anthem. Taylor's biblically inspired poetry describes an imaginary celebration following the Ascension of Christ, an occasion marked each year on the Day of Ascension (celebrated this past week on Thursday, May 29). The joyous work begins with instrumental fireworks on the organ—"God is gone up with a triumphant shout!" the choir exclaims, and the organ rushes to join them. The piece is organized into three major sections: jubilant music of praise dominates the two outer sections, with a more serene section in the middle. This inner section, featuring sustained melodies and floating harmonies, beautifully captures images of flitting heavenly creatures encircling the chariot of God.

Olivier Messiaen was one of the most renowned organists and composers of the 20th century. His wonderfully evocative work, L'ascension ("The Ascension") began its life as a four-movement suite for orchestra. This morning we hear the profoundly stirring second movement as the prelude: Alleluias sereins d'une âme qui désire le ciel ("Serene alleluias of a soul that longs for heaven"); and the thrilling third movement as the postlude: Transports de joie d'une âme devant la gloire du Christ qui est la sienne ("Outbursts of joy of a soul before the glory of Christ, which is its own glory"), often referred to simply as Transports de joie. Like God Is Gone Up, we hear Messiaen's music this morning in commemoration of the Day of Ascension.


