





WORSHIP NOTES

The Anthem is a very famous setting by one of the great-grandfathers of English choral music, Charles Villiers Stanford. *Beati quorum via* ("Blessed are those"), is the second in a set of three motets for unaccompanied choir, composed around 1892 and published in 1905. The motets are dedicated to Alan Gray and the choir of Trinity College, Cambridge, and are widely considered to be amongst Stanford's finest choral compositions. In particular, the elegant six-voice part writing in *Beati quorum via* ensures its place as one of Stanford's most exquisite compositions for unaccompanied choir.

The Offertory Anthem, *Let the People Praise Thee, O God,* is a joyful anthem composed by William Mathias for the wedding of Prince Charles to Lady Diana Spencer at St. Paul's Cathedral in 1981. Mathias's strikingly individual choral style is characterized by a distinctive rhythmic fluency, which often has been compared to his famous compatriot, Benjamin Britten. This exciting piece also perfectly illustrates the colorful organ parts that buttress many of Mathias's choral compositions. The contrasting soft, tender passage for sustained voices (with a gently rocking accompaniment) midway through the anthem is a wonderful example of Mathias's melodic gift for fashioning sustained passages from almost plainsong-like fragments.


